National Security Certificate Program

The undergraduate National Security Certificate (NSC) Program at Norfolk State University (NSU) will require 18 credit hours. The requisite credits may be earned as a part of a student's academic program of study, or as a stand-alone certificate program. These courses may also be taught via distance learning in the Center's video tele-training room.

At the core of the NSC program is the study of strategic languages and cultures. Arabic, Chinese, Japanese and Korean will serve as the core courses with a minimum of 6 credit hours in either of the four strategic languages and culture studies required. The participating programs include the Dozoretz National Institute for Mathematics and Applied Sciences (DNIMAS), the Department of Engineering, the NSU Honors Program and the Interdisciplinary Studies Program. However, any student enrolled at NSU is eligible for participation in the NSC program.

Typically, this National Security Certificate can be earned by students participating in the Internationally Diverse Education and Area Studies (IDEAS) program sponsored through the Intelligence Community Center for Academic Excellence by using the current general education requirements for their majors as well as technical, cultural and unrestricted electives. The courses selected for the NSC must include at least 9 credits hours of 300 or 400 level course work. Capstone or senior level courses in the participating programs may also be accepted for inclusion as an approved course under the NSC program.

The foreign language courses described within this brochure can be substituted for the for the humanities requirement in the general education core.
